Your pathway Your university

CDU offers a range of full-time intensive study programs, providing a supported pathway to prepare First Nations students for university study.

You can choose a program that matches your interests like health, arts and humanities, teacher education, STEM, engineering, law, business or accounting.

The free programs offer mentors, tutors and support services to help you succeed. The programs extend beyond class sessions to help you develop a sense of connection and belonging with each other, the University, staff, support services, and in the professional community.

Once you complete your program, you will be assisted in applying for the right next course for you. This may include additional preparatory units through the Tertiary Enabling Program (TEP) or direct entry into certificates, diplomas or degrees.

The First Nations pathway programs run in full-time intensive blocks (Monday – Friday, 9am – 4pm) at campuses across the Northern Territory. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

If you are a First Nations student interested in further education, CDU's pathway programs can be a great way to get started.

The First Nations Pre-Law Program is a 6-week intensive with 3-week face-to-face classes required. The course is an introduction to study law for First Nations students. This free program provides basic academic skills and knowledge in legal research, writing, reasoning and advocacy, and a pathway into CDU's Bachelor of Laws.

Gain the confidence, connections and an understanding of the expectations of higher education to pursue further study and a career in law.

When you start the program, you will have the opportunity to be connected with a tutor who can offer academic support and help you succeed. The program also provides opportunities for connection and belonging with each other, university staff and the professional legal community.

Successful completion of the program provides candidates with a pathway into the CDU Bachelor of Laws program, with the potential to commence law studies immediately after completion of the pre-law program.

The *First Nations Introduction to University* program is your first step into university. If you're an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander person, 17 years or older, and thinking about studying in Health then this program will provide you with academic skills, confidence and an introduction to both study and careers in your chosen stream.

The program gives you the opportunity to work out what area of health study you might be interested in and gives an introduction to both clinical and non-clinical health careers.

Through the program, you will study two connected units; an academic skills unit and a health-specific unit which introduces the different knowledge areas of;

- > health and wellbeing
- > health policy
- > health research and
- > health management

In this course we explore with you both First Nations and Western ways of knowing, doing and sharing knowledge in health.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

Outside the classroom, you'll participate in activities designed to connect you with fellow students, university staff, and the wider professional community.

Through the program, you will study two connected units; an academic skills unit and a science and technology specific unit which introduces the different knowledge areas of;

- > Environmental Management
- > Information Technology (IT)
- > Aviation - Remote Pilot (using drones)
- > Applied Science for Indigenous Enterprises

In this course we explore with you both First Nations and Western ways of knowing, doing and sharing knowledge in science and technology.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

The *First Nations Introduction to University* program is your first step into university. If you're an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander person, 17 years or older, and thinking about studying in Teacher Education then this program will provide you with academic skills, confidence and an introduction to both study and careers in your chosen stream.

The program gives you the opportunity to work out what area of Teacher Education study you might be interested in and gives an introduction to different teaching careers.

Through the program, you will study two connected units; an academic skills unit and a Teacher Education specific unit which introduces some key aspects of becoming a registered teacher, including:

- > Professional Standards for teachers
- > First Nations-led education programs and initiatives
- > Embedding Indigenous ways of learning in classrooms and schools.
- > Supporting students language development and social and emotional learning.

In this course we explore with you both First Nations and

Western ways of knowing, doing and sharing knowledge in teacher education.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

In this course we explore with you both First Nations and Western ways of knowing, doing and sharing knowledge in the arts and humanities.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

The program supports you to be successful in your subsequent studies in the business and accounting fields.

Through the program, you will study two connected units; an academic skills unit and a business and accounting specific unit which provides a broader understanding of;

- > the modern global business environment,
- > ethical practices in business and accounting,
- > budgeting, book-keeping and personal taxes.

The program will also introduce you to the higher education environment and expectations for study.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

The program supports you to be successful in your subsequent studies in engineering fields.

The engineering program is an intensive course designed to introduce you to the experience of studying engineering at CDU.

Through the program, you will study two connected units; an academic skills unit and an engineering specific unit which provides the opportunity to learn about;

- > the role of engineers in society, and
- > the integration of Indigenous knowledge, engineering and science.

You can complete the program in a four-week block or spread

your study over two two-week blocks. Financial support for travel and accommodation can be accessed if significant travel to the campus is required.

You will be supported throughout the program by a tutor who will help you with academic support and assessments, as well as a First Nations mentor to guide you through your transition to academic life and build a sense of belonging at CDU.

Outside the classroom, you'll participate in activities designed to connect you with fellow students, university staff, and the wider professional community.
